Mission Focus: Solid Rock Church

This month, I want us to share a local mission that is important to all of us: our church's mission. When we think of missions, we think of missionaries or mission groups, sometimes local or more often worldwide. I want to challenge your thinking.

The church's mission is to make disciples and to share the gospel with others. That is often the case with missionaries or mission cases. In both cases, missions and missionaries are called to help others come to know Christ, to live through Christ, and to trust God in all ways.

The missions we support all do the same things, just in different ways or settings. The church is no different. When we give to missions or to a certain missionary, it is often to help them with daily expenses so they can get the word out. In years past, as a child, I would often hear missionaries who came to our church for a yearly support talk say that the money we gave them would go toward living or travel expenses so they could share the gospel of Jesus Christ. I sometimes think we have lofty ideas that our money will go toward some outstanding project or cause, and sometimes it does. Other times it is to help keep the missions or missionaries doing their thing.

The church is no different. We are in missions as well; we don't think about it or focus on that aspect of the church. We think of church as a building, and that building has expenses. We think that when the finance committee asks for money, they are asking for help with keeping the building open or with daily expenses. But if we change our mindset to see our church as a missionary in the local community, it changes our perspective. Like any mission organization, it needs monetary donations to keep the mission going.

It's a matter of choice. Do we think of our church as just a building, or do we think of our building as a mission, with our mission field being the community?

As mission chairperson, I am asking each of you to think of our church as a mission. As with all the other mis-

sions we support, I encourage you to give to the mission of the church so we can reach our community, make disciples, and share the gospel with others.

Solid Rock Card Ministry

Once a month on a Sunday morning you will hear an announcement about the Card Ministry meeting Friday at 5:30 p.m. Some of you know what it is; others may not know what it is or what they do. Is it a bunch that gets together and plays cards? No, is the simple answer.

The card ministry started over 20 years ago. It was formed in the early to mid 2000s. Barb Preston was the originator of this ministry, and between 10 and 12 women came and participated.

I am not sure when, but Linda (McDaniel) Howell took over. One of the card club's missions is to ensure each child has a sponsor who will support them through college graduation. The levels of support vary depending on the child and the sponsor. What happens is that, many times throughout the year, a sponsor is given a packet of greeting cards to send to their child. These greeting cards are unique and special because the card ministry makes them and then passes them out to the sponsors.

The second part of this mission is that greeting cards are made and sold in the church to anyone who needs one. You can find birthday, hello, thinking of you, anniversary, sympathy, and get-well cards on display in the hallway that leads to the church office across from the restrooms. Please, if you have not stopped by to look and purchase, do so.

So the card ministry that meets one Friday a month at 5:30 is women of the church who like to get together to make cards, eat dinner, and laugh a lot. Do you need this talent to join us? The simple answer is no. It does not take any talent or gift to do the things we do. You can come and cut paper, glue, cut out items, or do any number of things. The women will find something you can do. It is

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about being with one another, creating relationships while doing missions.

Approximately eight women come together to make cards to sell and have some fun. We are always looking for women (or men) who would like to join us. We order out, pause to eat dinner and have conversation, and then we continue after dinner. Once or twice a year, we go out on an excursion.

Linda's passing was a true loss to the ministry. In her honor, we have kept her memory alive and moving forward. Marsha Boyanowski and Shari Blinn have been the leaders of this group since Linda's passing.

As one of the newer members, I encourage you to come and check it out. The fellowship, the conversation, and the work we do are worth giving up an evening.

A Repair for Brokenness

Our lives are marked by brokenness, including broken relationships, broken promises, and broken expectations. Left unattended, these fractures can quietly shape us, hardening into bitterness or resentment.

How do we live with such brokenness without losing heart? We return, again and again, to God's faithful presence. In Him, we find not only comfort but restoration. God does not ignore what is broken. He meets us in it, gently mending what we place in His hands and reshaping what feels beyond repair.

Scripture reminds us, "He heals the brokenhearted and binds up their wounds" (Psalm 147:3, NIV). What we cannot fix on our own, God is able to restore in His time and in His way.

Henri Nouwen, a Dutch Catholic priest, professor and spiritual writer, often spoke of this sacred return, the daily turning back to God where healing begins and hope is renewed. In His presence, our brokenness is not wasted. It becomes the very place where grace takes root and new life begins.

faithful. I can say that I'm learning to see God's point of view in this matter. His way is far greater than anything I can try to control.

But it's not just my life that I'm observing; I am looking at the lives of others: family, friends, the congregation, the community, the world around me. Common trends I am beginning to see are as follows:

- **Self will vs. God's will** – More and more, people are more focused on what they want more than seeing what God is desiring for them. Everyone goes through this once in a while; however, I am seeing more people staying in this mindset and neglecting/rejecting God's will for them. Putting family/friends, vocations, finances, events, hobbies, possessions, philosophies and more first are pushing out the ability to see God's will and desire for intimacy with us.
- **Anger towards God** – Maybe there was a time that we believe God has abandoned us or that God hasn't provided what we wanted/when we wanted/how we wanted things to go. If His will goes against the grain of our will, then obviously God doesn't really care for us. God does care for us and that's why He sometimes says "no." He knows what is needed; even when we can't or refuse to see for ourselves.
- **Worldly focus** – Let's be real, the world has a great deal to offer. There's a great deal of things that are fun and enjoyable. We are conditioned to look for gratification any way possible. This interferes with many things: our families suffer from our absences as we pursue these worldly desires and goals. Our faith walk suffers as we concentrate on what the world says is important to "make it" in life. Many have sought and obtained these earthly goals only to discover that it was never enough and that the cost of their pursuit was too much.
- **"Organized Religion" dysfunction** – It might not be a "God issue" but more of a "religion issue": the organized church has either hurt/abused its people; maybe they had a conflict with the pastor/clergy, members of the congregation might not have been kind to them. Things like political/religious points of view conflict or challenge their points of view, or simply the Scriptural identification of sin goes against their interpretation of what sin is/isn't causes people to abort organized religion.

These being said, I want to now ask you the question: *What's more important than your relationship with God?* My faith journey has proven to me that there's no greater importance than my relationship with God: not my family, friends, vocation, hobbies, possessions, notoriety, or anything of this world. I am still learning this truth and I

am working daily to get closer to God in every way possible.

The other Sunday, I preached on the importance of having our heart aching for the souls of others; not in a judgmental manner, but in one that is truly concerned about those on our hearts getting to know the joy of our salvation in Christ Jesus. I notice the empty pews and chairs and wonder, *Lord, why are people not drawing close to You anymore? What is capturing the attention of Your people to long for the things of this world more than intimacy with You?* It's not just a single church denomination that is experiencing this trend – the things of this world continue to seduce people away from God. How do we confront this?

We must determine what is more important to us. Is our relationship with God the most important thing in our lives or is it the things of this world? I can't answer this question for you; that's between you and God. And God knows our hearts: we can convince others that our relationship with God is important, but do our actions reveal a different truth?

Maybe growing old is a good thing, but I pray that we learn this truth at any stage of our lives: we're not promised our next breath and it's too late should we die before we have the realization of the importance of our relationship with God. Seek Him while He can still be found! Don't be like the rich man who walked away from Jesus because he placed his hope in the things of this world more than the way of Christ. Be blessed.

What's More Important?

But seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be added to you. "Therefore do not be anxious about tomorrow, for tomorrow will be anxious for itself. Sufficient for the day is its own trouble. - Matthew 6:33-34; ESV

Recently, I've been taking inventory of many things: my faith walk, personal health, possessions I have, what possessions I don't really need, goals I want to achieve, relationships with my family and friends, relationships I wish I had, my ministry, my purpose, my legacy (is it what I want or is it one I desire to change?), and so on. Some might think that it's part of getting old and we begin to ponder such things... maybe...

I believe it's much more than this: I think it's more about what I consider to be important and the order in which I place it. Is it where I desire to have it? Is it what order that God desires for me? What things do I control

and refuse God to interfere? What things should I give God complete control over and refuse myself from interfering?

I am discovering that the older I get, the less that I desire to have control over or possess. I am currently beginning to "downsize" some of my possessions. I am also downsizing the demands on my life in various ways – learning to say "No" or "Not now" or saying "Yes" when someone asks to help.

God is teaching me what is important in life. For years till present, I have worked hard for the things that would give me what I needed to raise my family, to earn finances to provide the necessities for the family and others (and being transparent, for things they/I wanted) and trying to be one that was much like Frank Sinatra sang, "I did it MY way." Yes, I try to be obedient to God, but my humanity interferes with my desire to be
